

Call To Order		Joanne Cochran called the meeting to order at 11:00 a.m.
Approval Of Minutes		On a motion by Kris Culler and seconded by Pat McCulloh, the minutes of the March 29 th meeting were unanimously approved as presented.
Old Business		
A. Discussion Related to Previous New Goal and Objectives	<p>Joanne opened the meeting by asking the group to each think of one goal related to access to care involving their agency.</p> <p>A. At the previous meeting, Joanne proposed a new goal: Reduce disparities in access and quality of care and improve outcomes across Franklin County's pediatric population ages birth to 5 years.</p> <p>To accomplish this goal, the access taskforce will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • target investments and technical assistance and promote outreach activities that address vulnerable pediatric needs and promote quality improvement activities that advance health equity • assure cultural competency and linguistically appropriate care in programs, policies and practices that impact this warm handoff between Keystone Health and Head Start <p>The objectives would be:</p> <p>Objective 1: Keystone Health and Headstart will develop a cultural competency and linguistically-appropriate warm handoff process for children ages 0 to 5 in the Keystone Women's Care office by May 2018</p> <p>Objective 2: Keystone Health and Head Start will develop a cultural competency and linguistically-appropriate warm handoff process for children ages 0 to 5 in Keystone Pediatrics-Chambersburg by June 2018</p>	

	<p>Stephanie Unger reported Penn State Mont Alto had 16 BSN graduates, and all have found jobs, most locally. Her student study SDOH.</p> <p>Donna Brandmeyer reported the Waynesboro Community Health Nurses program had its funding cut in half. They can manage 35 patients currently, but have 17 on a waiting list. They only have three nurses left in their program. They also often see transportation issues as patients need drivers when they are having surgery.</p> <p>Annette Searfoss reported Headstart has family advocates to do home visits, help with goal setting, identify barriers, etc. Their program's goal is to look at mental health in children and establish stronger partnerships with mental health services. The first few years in a child's life are critical.</p> <p>Robin Harmon reported a big issue she sees is insurance affordability in small businesses. Even people who have insurance have large deductibles and avoid going to the doctor unless absolutely necessary. It's also much too expensive to insure family members.</p> <p>Daphne Murray and Pat McCulloh reported Summit is trying to improve new patient access. They are also focusing on high utilizers of the hospital. They have a monthly report that helps them identify which patients could benefit from a care plan. They are also looking at readmissions and whether all are necessary. A county drug and alcohol case manager has been hired and works at the hospital.</p> <p>Noel Purdy reported Healthy Communities Partnership is training volunteers and the community about SDOH. There is a Public Health Training 101 on June 25 which is open to anyone in the community.</p>
