| Welcome & Introductions       | Noel Purdy welcomed the committee and introduced Barb Rossini to start the meeting.  |                  |
| Summit Health-WellSpan Update | Barb Rossini welcomed the committee and shared information regarding the next CHNA and the Healthy Franklin County website. She updated the committee on Summit Health's proposed partnership with WellSpan, explaining that a Memorandum of Understanding has been submitted and Summit and WellSpan will now proceed to the due diligence phase. She shared a video about WellSpan, noting the similarities between the two organizations. She then answered questions from committee members.   |                  |
| Approval of Minutes           | Noel asked for approval of the January 22, 2018 minutes. Shelly Schwartz motioned for approval, seconded by Melanie Furlong. All were in favor.  | Minutes approved |
| Project Manager Report        | <p><b>Governance Committee Update:</b> Noel reported that the Governance Committee met in January. The group is working on member recruitment and identifying different organization that could participate on the HFC Leadership Committee in the future.</p> <p><b>Ad Hoc Diversity, Inclusion and Discrimination:</b> Noel reported that the Ad Hoc committee is looking at data in other communities. Several committee members recently attended diversity and inclusion training. She encouraged HFC committee members to attend future trainings if possible as they were very beneficial. She noted that the Ad Hoc committee will probably evolve into a Task Force in the future.</p> <p><b>2018 CHNA Planning &amp; Scoping:</b> Noel advised the committee that NRC will be administering an online survey in Franklin County to collect primary data for the 2018 CHNA. Discussions are also being held with Berwood Yost from Franklin &amp; Marshall College about a possible contract.</p> <p><b>HFC Luncheon on May 3:</b> Noel invited committee members to attend the upcoming Inspiring Hope for a Bright Future luncheon on May 3 being sponsored by Healthy Franklin County and the Rotary Club of Chambersburg. The luncheon is open to the public and will feature keynote speaker Julia Cook.</p> <p><b>Public Health Training 101:</b> Community Services is partnering with the University of Pittsburgh to hold a public health training workshop on June 25. The workshop will provide information on public health and will include a poverty simulation facilitated by SCCAP. The location of the workshop is to be determined and will be announced when confirmed.</p> <p><b>HFC Scorecards and CHIP Year 3:</b> Noel reported that collection of data for Year 2 scorecards will begin soon, as well as establishing goals for Year 3. She shared a County comparison chart with the committee, noting that in 2017 Franklin County improved to 9 in Health Outcomes and 13 in Health Factors.</p> |                  |
| Task Force Reports            | <p><b>Nutrition:</b> Nickie Fickel reported for the Nutrition Task Force and the Garden and Food Insecurity workgroups. For the Garden workgroup, Nickie reported that an intern working for the group completed a community resource guide. The workgroup is partnering with Network Ministries to help expand their community garden. A survey was completed at the Waynesboro Housing</p>   |                  |

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|   | <p>Authority to determine interest in a community garden at their location. The committee discussed possibly doing grocery store tours at Mercado Latino to introduce people to the store and encourage shopping. The Food Insecurity workgroup continues working on the food insecurity map. They will be collaborating with SCCAP to distribute leftover food from the Gleaning Project to the Housing Authority.</p>  |  |
|   | <p><b>Mental Health:</b> Kenny Wuertenberg reported for the Mental Health Task Force. Kenny reported that the annual Wellness Conference will be held on May 4 at King Street Church from 8:00 – 3:00 pm; he will send a flyer to the group. The conference will focus on trauma. A high school principal from Warwick School District will be the keynote speaker and will share her personal story of trauma, recovery and resiliency and her efforts to inform educators, parents and the community about their role in supporting youth. The Suicide Prevention Coalition has trained 500 people year-to-date on QPR. The coalition is planning a workshop and will invite providers on the topic of zero suicide. They are currently researching keynote speakers.</p>  |  |
|   | <p><b>Access to Care:</b> Daphne Murray reported for the Access to Care Task Force. The Task Force is researching the health equity concept and how they can integrate it into their goals. The Task Force is partnering with Keystone Pediatrics and Head Start to initiate a program to increase access to care for children from birth to age 5. The plan is to eventually establish the same program in Waynesboro, Summit Health, and create a similar type program for Women’s Health Group. More details about the program will be shared at the next Task Force meeting.</p>   |  |
|   | <p><b>Physical Activity:</b> Heather Myers reported for the Physical Activity Task Force and the Community Engagement and Built Environment workgroups. The Community Engagement workgroup is launching the tagline Get Fit Franklin County. They received a Quality of Life grant to create a booklet containing trail and physical activity information, walking groups, free programs. They are also looking into a Talk with The Doc program to encourage people to speak with their physician about physical health. Members of the Built Environment committee attended a nonmotorized transportation focus group through Franklin County. The focus group is collecting input from the community on transportation issues in the county. They have received 200 comments to date. Heather will send a link for the focus group meeting schedule to the committee. Built Environment is also assessing the feasibility of a bike share program in Chambersburg. They are having difficulty finding partners for the program due to liability issues, so they are researching having Summit Health or another organization own the program and work with partners, like Coyle Free Library, to operate the program.</p> | <p>Heather will send link for nonmotorized transportation focus group meeting schedule</p> |
| Announcements & Updates from HFC Partners | <p><b>Franklin County Human Services:</b> Stacie Horvath introduced herself as the Director of Human Services for Franklin County. She reported that April 18 is Human Services Day and will feature speakers and workshops.</p> <p><b>Franklin County:</b> Carrie Gray reported that the County will issue a safety proclamation. The County is moving forward with the courthouse facility improvement plan which will include a new courthouse complex and improvements at the Admin Annex building. They are also working on the long-range transportation plan.</p>   |  |

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|               | <p><b>Mental Health Association:</b> Kenny Wuertenberg reported that May is Mental Health Month. The annual art show will be held the second week of May at the Mental Health Association facility and the 18<sup>th</sup> annual Walk the Walk will be held the Friday before Memorial Day.</p> <p><b>Greater Chambersburg Chamber Foundation:</b> Robin Harmon reported that they are recruiting candidates for the class of 2018-19 for the Leadership Franklin County program. There are some scholarships available through the program and community service projects will be available. May 15 will be the Lead Yourself broadcast.</p> <p><b>Waynesboro Community and Human Services:</b> Denise Esser reported they are trying to bring more awareness to Waynesboro of the Community Nurse program. They will be partnering with SCCAP to hold a poverty simulation on May 15 at the Evangelical Lutheran Church.</p> <p><b>United Way:</b> Amy Hicks reported that the Early Childhood Expo was held on April 14 and was very successful. She also reported that in May the United Way will host a series of volunteer projects for the May of Caring program.</p> <p><b>Summit Health:</b> Nickie Fickel reported that the 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade Initiative will be held on May 2-4 and will feature children’s author Julia Cook with a focus on bullying. May is Child Abuse Prevention Month. Summit Health partnered with Over The Rainbow to plant pinwheels in the community. A new series of Get Fit Now classes will start in May. Heather Myers reported that May is also Stroke Awareness Month. Community Services will offer a Walk with the Doc program at Norlo Park throughout the month featuring different doctors.</p> <p><b>CASD:</b> Brandi Glenn-Akers reported that they are finishing up the Go Girls Go program and will end the program with a 5k. Conversations are being held with Keystone about establishing health clinics in elementary schools, as well as dental care in schools.</p> <p><b>Practical Nursing Program:</b> Jan Collier reported that progress continues on the practical nursing building.
